- 1. Write a letter to your local newspaper. A list of papers with their email addresses is below.
- 2. Send your letter by email, and only send it to one paper at time.
 - a. Do not cc (or bcc) multiple newspapers.
- 3. In your 3-paragraph letter:
 - a. In your first paragraph, say that you believe every Vermont community and family should have access to an Expanded Learning Opportunity (ELO) program and dedicated state funding for afterschool and summer learning programs is a great step toward that goal.
 - b. In the second paragraph, write 1 or 2 short sentences about why you support ELOs. Some reasons you might want to use are on the back of this page, or feel free to add your own!
 - c. Wrap up by reminding readers that more expanded learning programs = more opportunities for Vermont's children and youth to succeed. If you are comfortable making "the ask," say that you hope Vermont legislators will support a \$2.5 million appropriation to the ELO Special Fund to close.
- 4. Keep your entire letter to no more than 150-300 words (three short paragraphs maximum).
- 5. Be sure to include your:
 - a. Full name
 - b. Town
 - c. Phone Number and Email Address

Promote Access for All.

What we need to do now is scale up across the state so that the ELOs that a Vermont child has access to are not limited by his/her family's circumstances or where they live in the state. This effort will take **strong state leadership and investment** and all of us working together to ensure that Vermont's children and youth have the resources and opportunities they need to succeed in school and in life.
